A reception was held in their honor on June 3, attended by their parents, grandparents, teachers, and local school officials. The students wrote a report about an ancestor and they were encouraged to interview family members, search through original documents, and discover their family's part in the history of our country. Many students wrote about an immigrant ancestor, or a grandparent who weathered the depression or World War II, and even the Vietnam War. Others wrote about their ancestors' jobs, the games they played, and the one room schools they attended. 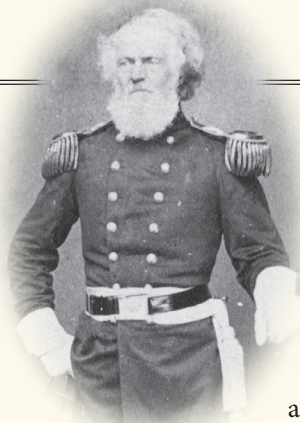

1960 Corvette Hums into Town

Which do you remember more clearly: the captain of your high school football team or his prized Corvette? Relive those teen-dream memories on Sunday, October 3rd, when you see a 1960 Corvette in pristine condition as the featured car of the Society's Antique and Classic Car & Truck Show. The show, in its 25th year, is moving to a *new location*, **Middletown High School**, on LaRosa Lane, off Newfield Street. Car registration begins at 8:30 am and judging starts at 11:30 am with trophies awarded at 2:30 pm. The rain date is Sunday, October 10. General admission is \$3.00, children under 12 are free; car registration is \$10.00. There is no cut-off date for cars being placed in the car corral, whereas cars registered for judging must be dated 1985 or older.

This year's featured car is owned by Al and Marie Johnson of Broad Brook, CT. It was made in St. Louis, Missouri and the 7979th one made out of 10,261 that year.

It weighs 2985 lbs and is powered by a 283 ci engine. The car new cost \$5134 when the average yearly salary was \$5400 and gasoline cost \$.25 a gallon. Some of the options included heater, courtesy light and hard-top as well as soft-top. This was the last year for tail lights, formed into the rounded rear fenders, and for the distinctive heavy "teeth" in the grill. Although the car is 50 years young, the Johnsons drive it on a regular basis!

The car show committee headed by Rich Bergan is busy making new class signs and preparing for the changes needed to hold the show on blacktop rather than a grass field. Other members of the committee are Jerry Augustine, Ray Beauregard, Pete Bozzo, Mark Olerud, Jack Pieper, Seb Sbalcio, and Debby Shapiro. Mansfield House Gardens Shine!

A project begun last year with the restoration of the back azalea garden by Boy Scout R.J. Wall, the planting of daffodil bulbs by Juana Flagg and the AIC group from The Connection, and the general clean-up by Ed Rubacha and Dave Wolfram, continued at a feverish pace this summer. Armed with the blueprints of our yard drawn by its designer, Helene Bliss Warner, and aided by the slides she took when the work was done in 1961, many volunteers worked in the heat to refurbish the gardens to their past glory.

Ed was back this summer pulling vines that had grown over the trees and the Middletown Housing Authority not only cleared away overgrowth from their side of the fence, but also cleared along our side and took away all the debris from the other aspects of beautifying the yard. Joe Samolis hauled



away all the outdated signs and other wood remnants that had accumulated over time. Denise Cahill, working tirelessly with her friend, Master Gardener, Mary Collins, weeded, edged, and transplanted throughout the front and side yards, and she even painted the porch and the wrought iron railings and gate. Sally McGee D'Aquila restored the

knot garden in honor of her husband, Sal's, 70th birthday. That was a huge job, which included tree trimming, and the removal of many layers of brush. You can now walk along the brick paths so carefully laid out by Helene. The Middletown Garden Club members continue their stewardship of the side yard herb garden. The Soldiers Are Marching Again!

In anticipation of the 150th anniversary of the Civil War, the Society is pleased to sponsor a living history event, an encampment of Company G, Fourteenth Regiment Connecticut Volunteer Infantry on Saturday, September 18, from 10 am to 3 pm. The Mansfield House backyard will be alive with demonstrations of camp skills and cooking and drilling and firearms demonstrations. Participants will be able to interact with the reenactors who are recognized for their high standards of authenticity. Company G's present membership has five members whose ancestors fought with the original 14th Connecticut.

The day's events will also include a performance of Civil War era music at 11 am by the ensemble Back Swamp. The group consists of local musicians Mary Cooke, Joe Mayer and Nancy Meyers on fiddle/violin; Wayne LePard and Tom Worthley on guitar, and Ron Krom on accordion. Songs by Middletown's own Henry Clay Work will stir the audience along

with traditional love ballads like Lorena and Shenandoah.

At 12:30 pm, William Hosley will present his new program, "Monumental Accomplishment: The Civil War and the Making of History." Prior to the Civil War there was no tradition

of public memorialization, almost no statues or monuments commemorating great events or deeds in the life of our country, and only a small emerging corpus of historical narrative and scholarship. After the Civil War, the supply and demand for these things surged. It was not an accident. The Civil War, an event of cataclysmic emotional and cultural significance, coincided with a wave of nostalgia and loss induced by the transformation of an agrarian society into an urban industrial society. The period's new engineering capabilities enabled the ultimate expression of this newfound turn to remembrance; the remnants include much of our most inspiring public sculpture, a wide layer of art and material culture, and some of our most auspicious public buildings and landmarks

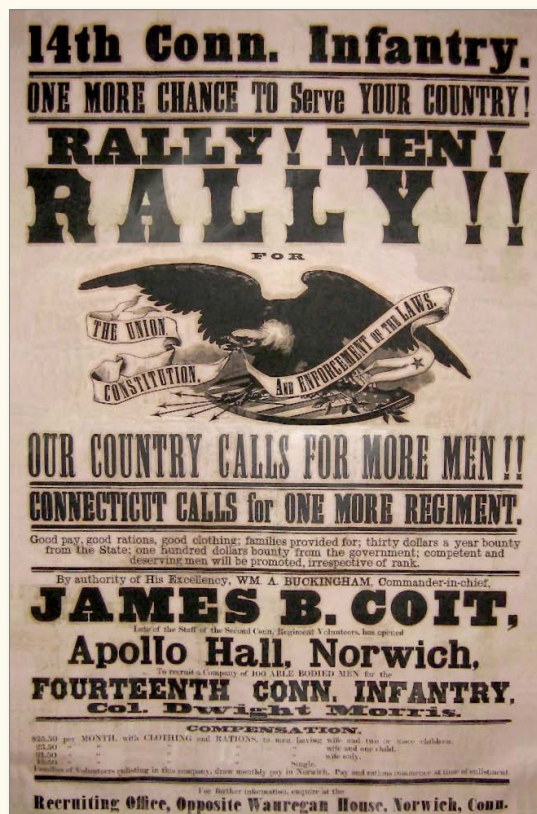
including the Connecticut State Capitol. Bill will provide an armchair tour of Civil War monuments, art and material culture in Connecticut and related places.

Bill Hosley, the principal of Terra Firma Northeast, is an independent scholar, cultural resource consultant, planner, writer, and photographer. He was a curator and exhibition developer at the Wadsworth Atheneum, most recently working on and writing the exhibition catalog for Sam & Elizabeth: Legend and Legacy of Colt's Empire.

Admission for this event is \$5, with children under 12 free. In the event of heavy rain, the encampment will be cancelled, but the music portion and talk will be held.

The Society's exhibits, *Hard & Stirring Times: Middletown and the Civil War* and *Greetings from*

Middletown: Changing Views of a Colorful City will be available for viewing. 🌿



Society Honored by State and National History Organizations

In June, the Society was honored to receive an Award of Merit at the state meeting of the Connecticut League of History Organizations. The Society's Civil War initiative which included the current exhibit "Hard & Stirring Times: Middletown and the Civil War," the placement of the exhibit on our website, www.middlesexhistory.org, and the development of curriculum using our Civil War archives for the local middle and high schools was cited for recognition.

We recently received notification from the American Association for State and Local History that we will

be receiving an Award of Merit at that group's annual meeting in Oklahoma City on September 24. Terry L. Davis, President and CEO, wrote, "The AASLH Leadership in History Awards is the nation's most prestigious competition for recognition of achievement in state and local history. We congratulate you for the work that has brought this honor."

The initiative was funded by a grant from the Connecticut Humanities Council with matching support provided by the Society's Antique and Classic Car Show Committee and many private donations. 🌱

Grand Vacations (1810 style)

Mr. Nathan Starr, Junior, and fellow Middletown citizens, Eben Townsend Junior and Captain Henry Austin, are on the adventure of a life time traveling to the Western Country and down the Ohio and Mississippi Rivers. They were joined on the stage at the beginning of their trip by others including "a Facetious old gentleman from North Carolina (who took good care to get on to the back seat between a blooming young lass belonging to Philadelphia & a lady from Baltimore with a child, who charmd us with the melody of its voice occasionally)" who enlivened the journey as he tried to make love to the ladies. One of the greatest sights Mr. Starr has seen so far are the Great Allegheny Mountains, which he graciously describes for the many of us that have not had the pleasure of visiting the area as "vast piles of mountains rising one above the other as far as the eye can reach—and deep valleys sinking almost down to the regions below." Our esteemed citizen was not as impressed with Chambersburg. "Both male and female were drunk as pipers by 1 o'clock... 'twas not uncommon to see the fair sex, if fair sex they may be called, for they are as ugly as the devil, toss off three glasses [of whiskey] in about ten minutes." Pittsburgh, on the other hand, is a fine town. "It is the most busy, industrious place of its size I have ever seen," and he predicts that "it must eventually be a great manufacturing town." WANTED: a picture of Jessie Alsop (1875-1951).

"Miss Alsop" (as I heard a 70-something Portland woman call her in perhaps 1980) was a local history dynamo during the later 1930s until her death in 1951. She wrote many columns for the *Middletown Press* on various aspects of local history, as well as many Colonial Dames reports on old houses up in the State Library. One can even go on the Internet and see her gravestone in Indian Hill Cemetery in Middletown. I have located most of her MP columns, but, so far, I have not seen a *picture* of this creative woman!
